

Biographies: Roald Dahl




The novelist, Roald Dahl, is one of the most famous authors of children and adult literature of the twentieth century.

Roald was born in Llandaff, Wales, on September 13, 1916. His parents, Harald Dahl and Sofie Magdalene Hesselberg, were Norwegian. His works reflect his origins with a mix of culture and traditions of Norway and life in Britain.

Roald's sister and father both died when he was very young. This was a blow to the whole family, especially his mother, who now had to take care of the family.

In his youth, he lived at a school in Repton near a chocolate factory that would send chocolates to the school for the boys to taste test. It was here that Dahl discovered the magic of rich, sweet chocolate and dreamed of creating a new chocolate bar. This was the inspiration behind his later novel Charlie and the Chocolate Factory.



In 1934, he worked at an oil company that transferred him to Tanzania, Africa to work on supplying fuel in that area. He had great adventures and unforgettable experiences in Africa, which are reflected in some of his works.

Five years later, he joined the Royal Air Force as a pilot. Some of the countries where he flew were Nairobi, Kenya, Egypt, Libya, and Iraq.

On one of those flights he had to make a forced landing in the desert, crashing the plane hard. Dahl fractured his skull and nose and lost his sight. He was rescued and taken to a hospital in Alexandria, where after much rest and care, he regained his vision.


Even though they thought there was little chance of him returning to be a pilot, he recovered and returned to his flying duties. All these experiences were embodied in his autobiography, Going Solo.

Roald Dahl began writing in 1942. A year later his first children's book, The Gremlins, was published. The characters were naughty creatures with big hearts.

Some of Dahl's more famous books for children of all ages were Charlie and the Chocolate Factory, The Witches, The BFG, Matilda, James and the Giant Peach, The Twits, and Boy, a book that tells about his childhood and enjoyable summers in Norway. In the 60s, he wrote scripts for screenplays. His wife, American actress Patricia Neal, and their 5 children encouraged him to write new stories and were inspirations for many of his books.



Roald Dahl died November 23. 1990 on Buckinghamshire from leukemia. He was 74. His spirit remains with us through his works, and donations to charities for sick children, and Marvelous Children's Charity, the Roald Dahl Foundation, founded after his death. 
If you have not been lucky enough to enjoy any of his books yet, I encourage you to do so. I guarantee you'll have moments of enjoyment and fun.


