### THE CORNUCOPIA AND THANKSGIVING

Thanksgiving is coming up, and people are getting ready for the big event. Homes filled with delicious foods cooked with lots of love and dedication. Between stuffed turkeys and pumpkin pies, I have always liked this typical symbol of the day, the cornucopia, or the horn of plenty.

Likely, you have seen it in countless places, such as television advertisements, propaganda, tablecloths, pictures, cards, and, of course, in your home. It is a symbol of wealth, abundance, and prosperity. It usually is represented by a horn-shaped container from which a variety of harvest foods such as corn, pumpkins, wheat, legumes, apples, nuts come out.



Originally, the cornucopia was made from the horn of a goat with food collected in the harvest in it.



Supposedly, this symbol comes from Greek mythology. According to legend, the god Zeus (father of the gods and men ruler of Olympus) was little was playing with his rays without paying much attention to his surroundings. Unfortunately, one of those rays hit a goat and cut off one of its horns. Seeing this disaster, Zeus filled the horn with

grains, fruits, flowers, legumes, and vegetables so that whoever had it in his power would have great wealth and abundance in his life.

This story is just a legend, but it is nice to think about its meaning. When you put a cornucopia in your home, you are celebrating the gratitude of having an abundance of goods.

If we analyze the name cornucopia, we realize that it comes from Latin, where "cornu" means horn, and "copia" means abundance.

Typically, when we decorate our house, this horn of plenty is bought in the form of a wicker basket shaped like a horn. Then, it gets filled with grains, fruits, nuts, and vegetables from the fall harvest. It is placed in a conspicuous place in the home, such as the living room furniture or in the center of the Thanksgiving dinner table itself.
